**Luigi Boccherini -Musica amorosa**

Elegance and lucidity, softness and sensibility are some of the outstanding qualities of Luigi Boccherini's music. In his time he was one of the most loved composers in Europe, one of a few. His music was held in high esteem in France, Great Britain, the Netherlands and Belgium as well as in Scandinavia, Austria and in Germany.

Luigi Boccherini (1743 – 1805) was primarily a composer of chamber music, although his 33 symphonies and 12 cello concerti have considerable merit. He produced about 125 quintets, more than 100 quartets, more than 50 trios, and more than 50 chamber works in other forms. Regrettably, his best-known work remains the *Cello Concerto in B-flat*, which was actually arranged from two Boccherini concerti and a sonata by the 19th-century composer and cellist Friedrich Grützmacher. Boccherini's well-known minuet is from his *String Quintet in E Major*, G 275. He also wrote a *Stabat Mater* which is recognized as one of the most delicate *Stabat Mater* of its time.

Boccherini .... has perhaps supplied the performers on bowed-instruments and lovers of Music with more excellent compositions than any master of the present age, except Haydn. His style is at once bold, masterly, and elegant. There are movements in his works, of every style, and in the true genius of the instruments for which he writes, that place him high in rank among the greatest masters who have ever written for the violin or violoncello. There is perhaps no instrumental Music more ingenious, elegant, and pleasing, than his quintets: in which invention, grace, modulation, and good taste, conspire to render them, when well executed, a treat for the most refined hearers and critical judges of musical composition.
